# WHY NOT US?

The early church was born during a time of political turmoil, persecution, and uncertainty regarding the future. One hundred or so people with no political power, money, or worldly influence faithfully followed Jesus' instructions to pray for the Spirit and begin their God-given mission to make disciples. God used them to turn the world upside down.

2000 years later, our calling and mission are the same as the first disciples— receive the Spirit and make disciples.

We live in a time of political turmoil and uncertainty regarding the future, but our Savior is still the same. His promises are the same, and He empowers His people just as He did when the church began.

In April of 2019, a majority of our staff traveled to Watermark Church in Dallas, Texas, to attend The Church Leader's Conference. The theme of the conference was based on Jesus' statement to His disciples in the upper room just prior to His crucifixion.

“Truly, truly, I say to you, whoever believes in me will also do the works that I do; and greater works than these will he do, because I am going to the Father. Whatever you ask in my name, this I will do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If you ask me anything in my name, I will do it.”

- John 14:12–14

Jesus is telling His disciples they will do even greater works than He did. The

speaker explained the context and then asked, “Why not us?”

What prevents us from doing the greater works that expand the kingdom of God? I listened to the speaker and leaned over to Dan Bovenmyer and answered the speaker’s question, “Because of us.” The “us” I was referring to includes me, the staff, the elders, and Grace Community Church as a whole. Jesus calls us to fruitfulness and full joy (John 15) and we intend to be fruitful and experience that joy, but it seems illusive. We/I seem to hinder the very work God intends to do through us.

Grace Community Church has been working with The Unstuck Group to reorganize to better pursue God’s purpose for His church pg 10-18. But as important as structure and organization are, structures and organizations don’t produce fruit. The Spirit does.

“Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing.”

- John 15:4–5

This fall the church will pursue the greater things that Jesus promised. It will be a season

of renewed focus on the gospel, prayer, and the power of the Holy Spirit for “apart from me you can do nothing.” The sermon series will take us through John 13-17 where Jesus prepared His disciples for His death, burial, and resurrection. In these chapters, He informed them how, through the Holy Spirit, they would do greater works. Sermons in and of themselves do not produce fruit. Jesus didn’t say, “If you listen to a moving series on John you will do greater works than these.” He said, “If you are my disciples, believe, and ask my Father, I will do greater things through you.”

The sermons serve to focus our attention on what Jesus said so we can believe and then know what to ask for and how to ask. More importantly than the sermon series will be the focus in prayer. Watch for instructions on a 40 Days of Prayer initiative in September that will direct us towards intercession for the church, the community, and the world.

# ALEX & TRISH LUDVICEK

We got an urgent message from the village of Daboto the other week, about a man named Yokim, who needed our help. He was bitten by a wild pig on his leg, and the wound quickly became severely infected. His only hope of survival was to get to a hospital. Without an airplane it would take over two weeks of hard trekking through the rainforest covered mountains, then through the lowland marshes to a river, then a week by boat, and that's if he were still mobile. It's safe to say the journey would be impossible due to the swollen and infected leg, even for a strong man who has only known this sort of travel.

Yokim's journey was still difficult, as he was forced to drag his body from his village to the village Daboto, where the closest airstrip lay. With restrictions as they currently are, it is difficult to bring anyone anywhere here. Through God's grace and the right relationships, we acquired the needed letters, rearranged the flight schedule, and picked Yokim up before it was too late. He is now safely recovering in the hospital in Nabire.

It's been a crazy two weeks, as we have had many medevac flights bringing in over 15 people in similarly dire situations. We feel honored to use the airplane to show Jesus' love, not only to spiritually transform people's lives, but physically too.

Team Ludvicek is back in Nabire after a week-long aircraft inspection in Sentani. We are learning to cope being one of two Western families in the town, so a prayer request is that God would open more opportunities to develop our relationships with our Indonesian friends.

We just celebrated our nine-year wedding anniversary, and happy to say we still like each other.

# GETTING UNSTUCK

Grace Community Church exists to glorify God by being and making disciples who make disciples. If you have been around Grace for a few years, you have heard us speak of our desire to be a movement of God that is constantly multiplying and branching out to our community and even to the nations as opposed to a monument, a work of man, that exists only for itself. To that end we launched the Momentum initiative in the fall of 2018. The goal was to cast a vision for a preferred future where we believed God wanted to take us. The goal was to align the whole church so that we would pray, serve, and give of time, talent, and treasure to the end that the gospel would transform us, this community, and the world.


Ironically, in the midst of Momentum, we realized we were stuck. In



hindsight, I can tell you we have been stuck for a lot longer than a year or two. If you have been around Grace long enough, you will recall this initiative or that challenge. Great God-honoring plans bathed in prayer meant to proclaim Christ and see Him honored. Plans were rolled out and launched and yet we kept finding ourselves stuck. We as leaders and you as a church doubled down with more effort and we still lacked momentum. It is like having your car stuck in the snow. Once you are stuck, stepping on the gas doesn't get you moving. It just burns fuel and creates slush. Over the years, we have tried harder without getting the results we prayed for. To be sure, God has been and is still at work. We have seen churches planted, people saved, and lives changed, but we can't shake the frustration of being stuck.

Last winter in the midst of rehashing the building plan for the billionth time, God gave me a metaphor that helped me start to see part of our problem. Bear with me for a moment as I describe our building.

We built in our current location in 1993. Back then no one expected the church to grow beyond 500 people. But we did. As we grew, we added to our facility, expanded parking, reconfigured this section of the building, re-purposed that section of the building, etc. Twenty-five years later, our building is a quilt. Not a really cool Amish quilt you might buy in



Group. We began working with them just about time the COVID-19 hit in March. In April, we launched a year-long process designed to help us become the movement of God that we aspire to be. It is the purpose of this article and our Unstuck videos to keep you, the church, informed and updated so you can better pray and be encouraged that your church is moving in a direction that honors God. We desire that you will be excited to partner with us as we seek to see thousands come to faith in Jesus.

## THE PHASES OF BECOMING UNSTUCK

Kalona, but a patchwork of different materials sewn together to cover a growing body. There was never a long-term, strategic plan to expand our facility to serve our growing church. It occurred to me that our staff and leadership structure at Grace parallels our building. At one point we had two pastors and one secretary. We grew, added staff, added responsibilities to staff, and just kept adding. Our structure is more reactionary than strategic. Our church is made up of people who love Jesus, pray, and work hard in a system and structure that hinders the very work we try to advance.

It is for this reason that we sought out The Unstuck

The year-long process that we're in is organized in four sections which correlate with the four phases of our reorganization process with the Unstuck Group. - 1 Assessment – How are we doing?
- 2 Planning – Where are we going?
- 3 Structure – Who does what?
- 4 Action – Did we deliver?

## PHASE ONE: ASSESSMENT

Every church has a life cycle. Churches are born, they grow, and eventually they decline and die.

After a battery of surveys, questionnaires, and data crunching, we learned we are currently in a place of maintenance. Attendance is high, our financial situation is stable, and people are busy, but the church is bogged down in increasing complexity. There is frustration over a lack of vision and alignment within the church. As the staff and elders worked through this phase with The Unstuck Group we had three takeaways.



**1 We are optimistic, but we need to get the right people in the room making decisions.** Everyone is working hard and loves Jesus, but our structure makes it difficult for us to carry out the very things we desire Christ to accomplish through us. It is unclear how decisions in our organization should be made and by whom. You as a church member experience this when you can't figure out who you need to talk to get something done or you feel like you need permission to serve the Lord instead of being empowered to serve the Lord.

**2 Hard to win if we don't know what the win is.** Everyone knows that we are supposed to make disciples, but we lack a clear compelling vision that defines the win. You as a church member experience this when you hear of the next big thing and walk away thinking, "The leadership sure means well, but I don't think they know where they are headed."

**3 We are busy, running frantic, but in different directions - not listening well to each other.** With the vision unclear and decision-making rights in question, we are a church filled with hard-working people who love Jesus, each trying to serve Him without a unified direction. You as a church member experience this when you talk to different leaders and discover each gives you a different answer to the same question – where are we headed?



**Phase One Summary – A busy church filled with leaders who mean well but lack vision and are structured poorly is a recipe for stalled Momentum.**

## PHASE TWO: PLANNING

Without a vision, the people perish.

*Where there is no prophetic vision the people cast off restraint, but blessed is he who keeps the law.*

-Proverbs 29:18

The idea behind this verse is that without a clear and compelling vision for a preferred future, people will just go their own way. I had a conversation recently with a frustrated church member. They shared their frustration over a number of issues and then shared that there were others who shared these

frustrations over this, that, and the other thing. They shared that some were even considering leaving the church. I listened, asked questions, and then made the following statement.

“I have no doubt people are frustrated and will probably leave Grace. But if they leave, it will not be because of this issue or that issue, it will be because we have failed to cast a compelling vision for the future.”

This person paused, thought about my statement, and agreed. It's not any one issue, it's an overall lack of direction that hamstrings our organization. We spent two days in late May with The Unstuck Group deliberating a God-determined direction for this church. We prayerfully sought God for direction and what would need to happen to make that a reality. The following diagram provides a visual of what we worked through.

We began the process of working our way up the strategic alignment pyramid starting at the foundation. If we are going to be a movement, we need momentum, and momentum requires alignment, not just



working hard for Jesus. Grace has nailed the foundation level. We know our core beliefs, why we exist, and who God wants us to become. That is a good thing and without a solid foundation, whatever is built will collapse. *But*, once we move beyond the foundation and move up the pyramid, things get fuzzy. When you get to questions like where we are going, and how are we going to get there, you have as many different visions as you do leaders in the church (only a slight exaggeration).

Our planning sessions with The Unstuck Group zeroed in on who God wants us to reach and how He wants us to reach them. We asked you to pray during a 48-hour prayer vigil that corresponded with this time of planning. During

that time of planning and the praying of God's people, we have emerged with a framework for a distinct, clear, and compelling vision we will roll out in the fall. The vision is specific, time-bound, and, measurable. While that is progress, we are only half way up the alignment pyramid. The Unstuck Group will return late August to help us through the development of organizational goals, strategies, and ministry priorities. Keep praying as there is much work to be done. God is giving us a clear picture of what He wants to see us become and what that might look like, but we have not yet addressed how to get there.

Here is what we will address:

- Finding agreement on our church's purpose
- Reframing our mission field
- Defining our discipleship path
- Identifying our growth engines
- Crafting a five-year vision
- Building a system to monitor church health
- Building action plans, systems, and structures

In late August we will meet up again to traverse the top portion of the alignment pyramid: organizational goals, strategies, and priorities. Knowing where you are, where you want to go, and the path you want to take to get there is only part of the process.

### **PHASE THREE: STRUCTURE**

Before we move out, we need to be clear on who does what. How we are structured and who does what is an important part of strategy. Here is a cold hard fact: Grace Community Church is structured in such a way that can adequately lead and shepherd a church of 300 people. Newsflash. We passed 300 people some time in 2003.

Here are some symptoms of inadequate structures and systems:

- It takes forever to make decisions
- Plans are made and then fizzle out

- There is poor or bottlenecked communication
- Staff focuses on doing ministry instead of empowering others to do ministry
- The congregation is frustrated with the church leadership
- The leadership team is frustrated with one another

And, just in case you are wondering, you can check every box for Grace.

In late June, we met with The Unstuck Team to tackle structure and staffing. We learned that how you structure should be a function of your strategy and not your core beliefs, like we originally thought. The centrality of the gospel is a core belief. How we organize, and who does what, should change as needed, even though the gospel doesn't change. This is one of the reasons why there is so little direction from the Bible on how the New Testament church should be organized. The emphasis is on character and doctrine. Be like Jesus and teach what Jesus taught. Well, how should we organize? Should we have this organizational chart or that organizational chart? I think if the apostle Paul could answer that question he would say, "Ask God to grant you wisdom, pray, devise a strategy that honors the gospel and is consistent with the principles you see in the Bible."

So here is what we worked on...

- Assessing individual strengths and group dynamics
- Clarifying decision rights
- Identifying team strengths and challenges
- Assessing staff leadership capacity and potential
- Planning the restructure and evaluating the impact

After team and individual strength analysis, as well of two days of meetings, The Unstuck Group has proposed a structure that serves to advance the vision and strategy of a church of our size. As of July 15, 2020, your elders are favorable about the overarching structure with questions about the details. We hope to prayerfully adopt and implement these new structural changes and modify them to suit our specific ministry context in the months ahead. Pray that the elders hear from God and walk in humility and wisdom.

## **PHASE FOUR: ACTION**

At the end of the day, Jesus wants us to make disciples who make disciples. All this structure and strategy is worthless if people do not come to Christ, get equipped, and then lead others to come to Christ. This fall expect to hear a God-sized, five-year vision that will be impossible apart from God's intervention and empowerment. It will be specific and time-bound. At



the end of 2025, we will be able to look back and see if that vision was realized or if we came up short.

As we continue to hammer out our strategies and set organizational goals, we will come back together in 90 days with our Unstuck Team and evaluate if progress was made. If progress was made we will celebrate the wins. If there is no progress, we will assess and retool.

Three goals of phase four are:

- Put plans into action
- Refresh priorities
- Maintain alignment

## **IN CLOSING MY BROTHERS AND SISTERS,**

Grace Community Church is where I came to Christ, grew as a young believer, discovered my spiritual gifts, was empowered as a leader, and have pastored for the last 22 years. I have seen God do amazing things in my life, the life of my family, and the people that comprise this local body. While I love this church, Jesus loves us way more. His love for us is so passionate that He will not allow us to stay as we are. He has allowed us to experience the pain and dysfunction due to poor planning, wrong

structures, and sin so that we would cry out to Him in humility and pray, "Father deliver us from ourselves and show us what to do."

That has been my prayer for the last few years and God is answering that prayer. Thank you for your commitment to this church and your patience as we seek to grow into the kind of church that God can entrust with a God-sized vision. Keep praying and let's follow Jesus one step at a time.

# SOUL CARE SNIPPETS

## CONTROL FREAK BY AIMEE MARINO

I don't really think of myself as a control freak...until I get in my car.

It is on the road that I am most acutely aware 1) of my own self-righteousness as I judge driving habits that don't line up with my preferences, and 2) just how little control I have over my world. When a stop light skips my green turn arrow, when I hit that red light, when I'm stuck behind someone observing the speed limit, and frankly, the fact that I am unable to read other driver's minds about what they are going to do... these bring out my inner five-foot she-Hulk. It's jarring to those who have the misfortune of driving with me when someone cuts in front of me or, in a particular instance, where a clearly deranged, enormous, possibly radioactive, hungry-for-humans possum ran straight into our narrow path. For that one, I didn't even have to be driving for my inner Hulk to come out. This results in some key phrases and attitudes that I will spare you from (you're welcome).



Can you relate? As regulations keep changing, plans for back-to-school continue to unfold and morph day by day, as the future of your job is a big question mark, or as another driver swerves into your lane, do you find your inner control freak rearing its ugly head?

Even though I'm not driving as much these days, I'm still getting more practice than I would like on reining that inner control freak she-Hulk. For you, this might come out in obsessive planning, worry, anger, straight up fear, disappointment, or despondency. We are all getting some practice on depending on God right now.

Here are the facts: 1) There are things that we as individuals can control, and over which we have responsibility. 2) Then, there's everything else— that which we can't or shouldn't control. These are the things we get to trust God with. Yes: get to. It's a gift, y'all.

In the things that we do have a responsibility to control, we must carefully obey our Savior. When I'm in the car, I am responsible for my actions, attitudes, and responses/reactions to others. I have a responsibility to obey the laws of the land, to be wise, to control my tongue, and be renewing my mind when my attitude is poor. These are all within my little circle of responsibility. No one else can do these for me. It is not another driver's fault if I choose to react sinfully. Nope, that's on me. For the things within my control (myself: attitudes, actions, and reactions), I have a responsibility to carefully obey God.

The tougher part for me is all those things that lay outside that little circle: other people (their actions, reactions, or attitudes), and my circumstances (the world around me): this is where I get my spiritual cardio for the day. These are the things with which we must intentionally trust God. These are in His court, and heaven forbid I try to take on what only God can be responsible for! When I'm driving, I can't control whether someone else checks their blind spot before merging, their speed, the road conditions or where construction detours go, or how long lights stay red when I'm running late. For these things, I must take a deep breath, and commit them to God in prayer. I pray for God to keep me safe. I thank Him that He is the one in control, and that I can trust Him to be responsible for the things I have zero control over. I can trust Him to be loving, kind, good, just, and merciful... even when I'm fuming in the Target parking lot.

What are things right now that you are responsible for? Things

that only you can do? Make a quick list. Double check: if any of those things involve what other people choose to do or how they choose to react, cross 'em off. Are there any things on your list that are tied to being able to predict the future or control your surroundings? Scratch those out too. When you have your list, pray to your loving Savior. Consider how can you walk in loving faithfulness to God in these things. Pray for His empowerment for you to walk in faithfulness and peace.

What things are not in your control, and are God's responsibility? Make a list (yes, another one, seriously). Circumstances and others will feature heavily on this list. Go ahead and put God on there too, because, surprise, you can't control Him. You can control whether you choose to pray to Him, to ask things of Him, but not how He answers and acts. Now, pray through each thing on this list, actively releasing control and responsibility of each item to God. Acknowledge that these are things that you have no control over, and that God is responsible for them. Tell Him that you want to trust Him with these things, even when it's hard. Confess what things are particularly difficult to trust Him with, and pray for strength to believe that He is good and powerful, and that He will always work for His glory and the good of His people.

These are lists that you might have to make in your head each and every day, multiple times per day, but it's worth it. We get the chance to faithfully walk in obedience with what God

has entrusted to us. As believers, we have power through the Holy Spirit inside of us to exercise self-control (Gal 5:23), and step out in obedience to our King, knowing that He has empowered us to follow Him and He gives grace when we fail.

We get a chance to practice dependence on a good God, to worship Him for His power over all things, and to release our desire for control. Do we still pray for these things? Absolutely! And we walk in peace knowing that our God always acts according to His character: in love, for His glory, and for the good of those who love Him, making us more like Jesus in the process.

So, if you drive by a little red Honda with Grace logo bumper sticker, and the driver is slightly green, possibly beginning to smoke at the ears, and clearly talking to herself, that's me getting to practice taking responsibility for myself, and depending on my Savior for the things I can't control. (But please still use your turn signal. That's on you.)
