KEEPING UP WITH THE LUDVICEKS

We enjoyed having Alex, Trish, Jackson, and Benaya back in Iowa from June 2021 - January 2022. They have since returned to Indonesia and are serving at a MAF Base in Nabire. Recently Pastor Paul had a chance to catch up with the Ludviceks via Zoom, and we wanted to share a few excerpts from that.

How have things changed since you returned from furlough to Nabire?

Moving back from a big church to having biblical community with just three families has its challenges. There are days we don't even see that many families! However, we are getting established in the local church and building up our Indonesian community. This is pretty important for our spiritual lives. It has also been a blessing that we returned to the same spot we left. Feeling established in this way is helpful to our work and family life.

What is the biggest challenge for you right now?

Our responsibilities transitioned from building ministry partnerships to many field responsibilities with boots on the ground. Also, Alex transitioned to base manager besides his other duties, which brings more ways to serve, but additional challenges. Also...there is a lack of candy here!

What is one thing that encouraged you this past month?

I got a text message from Pastor Paul that said I love you! Our local staff in Nabire really welcomed us well. The transition to Alex's job has not been hard because the staff has been so helpful. It is also encouraging to see how much the ministry has been going on since we were gone—encouraging to see how things progressed. A village we served now has written copies of 1 and 2 Corinthians.

Another village literacy program has increased.



So, Lynette, how long have you attended Grace?

What are you most passionate about?


Helping others. At Grace, it's helping to service the staff and volunteers. In my personal life, it's working with others in Weight Watchers in their health and wellness.

As we have journeyed through the psalms this winter and in our lead-up to Easter, we have seen that God is a refuge and help to his people no matter how hopeless and exhausting their situation may be. As followers of Jesus, it is so easy to lose sight of this. However, imagine not having such a refuge, left out in the cold to brave the elements that this life throws our way. That is what life looked like for us before we knew Christ; it is what life looks like for our friends, family, and neighbors who do not know Jesus. As Paul puts it in Ephesians, "You lived in this world without God and without hope." This Easter, we can share the best news we have ever received with those we know and love.

On Easter, we will begin in Psalm 73. In Psalm 73, we find the psalmist, in this case Asaph, lamenting as he sees the world seemingly at ease while he struggles. However, when he steps into the sanctuary of the Lord, he gains the perspective that he needs. He states in Psalm 73:25–26:

Whom have I in heaven but you?
 And there is nothing on earth that I desire besides you.
 My flesh and my heart may fail,
 but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever.



Because of how God has provided for Asaph, we, too, can have one priority and one desire for our lives. We can find help in our time of need. This is the good news of what God has provided for us. We now have the advantage of the New Covenant and the atonement of Christ on our behalf!

We will then take a look at the words of the resurrected Jesus to his disciples in Luke 24 where Jesus tells his disciples that the whole of scripture is talking about him. He is the rock and refuge that we need. He then reminds them of his call and commission on their lives. He states,

"Thus it is written, that Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance for the forgiveness of sins should be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem" (Lk. 24:46-47).

We are called to remember and experience the good news and share it with others. This Easter, we have a great opportunity to do both. Join us for Easter and invite a friend, family member, or neighbor.

B.L.E.S.S.ing Each Other & Building the Kingdom

Many of you have window clings that say, "Begin with Prayer." We've been handing these out at Grace since last fall, and you can still get some from the information desk in the foyer. We've been handing out these physical reminders of the importance of prayer for two reasons. One, it is always good to pray. And every reminder to pray is a good reminder. And two, we have been preparing you for our upcoming sermon series on Loving Well.

Before he left on his sabbatical, Pastor Brooks said this to me: "If we are to be a church that makes disciples, we must adopt a culture of lifestyle evangelism." By that, he meant that we, as God's people, need to actively love each other within the church, but also the people we come into contact with on a daily basis. Pastor Brooks has mentioned the way this concept is developed in the book B.L.E.S.S, by Dave Ferguson and Jon Ferguson. If you haven't read that book, we encourage you to check it out. But even if you don't, consider the ways that "BLESS" allows us to love everyone well.

BLESS

This idea is pretty self-explanatory. All of our work in this world must be done for God's glory if it is to be of any value. And an excellent way to ensure that we are working in God's will is to devote every action to him in prayer.

LISTEN

Being quick to speak gets us into trouble, and it doesn't help build relationships. Jesus taught and talked a lot. But he also listened to the sick, the poor, the hungry, and the hurting. We can build relationships with those around us much faster when we listen to people the way Jesus did.

EAT

Having people over to your house or going out to share a meal is a great way to break down barriers. It can be difficult in pandemic times, but even socially-distanced cups of coffee shared on an afternoon walk can open connections to care for one another.

SERVE

People cannot ignore you living out your faith when you serve them or serve with them.


Service is a powerful demonstration of belief when we serve with the heart of Christ
