WHAT IS PRAYER, PART II

PRAYER IS THE ACT OF INSERTING OURSELVES INTO GOD'S COMMUNION with himself and asking him to listen to us. Properly done, this involves the Holy Spirit speaking up for us. It also involves our giving up everything that we think and hope for in exchange for God's thoughts and plans.

You've likely heard these right attitudes and actions described through the acronym ACTS: Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, and Supplication. Some people use that acronym and those terms to describe different types of prayer, or prayers made for different purposes. Whether you want to learn the acronym or not, it is useful for calling attention to the varied aspects of prayer that Jesus teaches. Examining Jesus' prayer in Matthew 6:9-13 we see the parts of ACTS modeled for us:

ADORATION/PRAISING GOD: "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be Your name."

Jesus gives us the example of the most basic form of praise - simply saying "We praise your name, Father!" There are many other ways we can praise God in prayer. Like the psalmists, we can highlight God's creative works and his wonders (e.g., Psalm 145, Psalm 8). Like the prophets, we can praise him for what he has done to save us in the past and how he is making a way for

us to spend eternity with him (e.g., Exodus 15). Or, like the apostles, we can praise him for the establishment of his church and the church's ongoing work (Acts 16, Revelation 5). Whatever the form of praise, it is good to praise the Lord for who he is and what he has done.

CONFESSION/FORGIVENESS: "Forgive us our debts, as we have forgiven our debtors."

This phrase teaches us that we need to confess our sins and ask forgiveness, and also forgive others when we pray. Part of the reason that God wants us to insert ourselves into his communion is to tell him we know when we have done wrong. Our confession of sin communicates a right attitude toward the Lord where we acknowledge our complete need of him. Likewise, asking that we be able to forgive, and that our forgiveness of others be tied to the forgiveness we receive, demonstrates humility. We don't confess our sins and forgive others just to feel good. We confess and forgive because we have been forgiven, and we want others to know forgiveness, too.

THANKSGIVING: "Your kingdom come, Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven."

How is this phrase from the Lord's prayer about giving thanks to God? Nowhere in this sentence do we see the word thanks, or thanksgiving. This is true. But think about what it means to ask for God's kingdom to come, and for his will to be done. If you are asking for that, you are asking for God to be king of your life, and of the entire world. There is no better way to thank someone than to give your life in service to that person.

You could argue that it is the only sincere thanks one could give when they have received

everlasting life at no cost. Not that this should be the only way we thank God. Prayers of simple, straightforward thanks to God are good and right as well. But while salvation is a free and gracious gift, any true thanks we offer in return for that gift will cost us something. Therefore, thank God by giving up your personal kingdom. Letting God reign in your life is a price worth paying as you thank the Lord in your soul, with your lips, and throughout your life.

SUPPLICATION/REQUESTS: "Give us this day our daily bread/And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one."

There are many types of requests. Jesus outlines two types that we should certainly be bringing to God. The first is a request for God to meet our daily needs: food, clothing, shelter, etc. Notice the inclusion of "daily" before the word "bread." We can ask for provisions that go beyond our simple needs, but Jesus teaches us to ask God for the daily, routine needs.

The second request is for spiritual strength and safety. And at its heart, this request is very similar to the first. Spiritual strength and safety is as much a daily need as food for our body. Of course, there are other types of needs. It is likely, in fact, that there are many people we know with needs that seem very important - physical health, protection from harm, etc. But of all of the requests that can be put before God, Jesus is clear God wants us to interject with requests for physical and spiritual essentials. At the very least, bring those requests before him as they help you think of God as your provider and Lord.

CURRENT PROJECTS

EXTENDING GRACE – Backpacks and School Supplies for Foster Families

Goal: \$3,000

Amount raised to date: \$10

'Back to School' is a time of year when families spend a lot of money preparing for school. Extending Grace plans to provide new backpacks and school supplies to over 180 families this year. Help Extending Grace to alleviate some of the financial burdens for these families.

EXTENDING GRACE – Foster Family Encouragement

Goal: \$3,000

Amount raised to date: \$605

Support foster families by offering opportunities for them to bond and grow together. Funds donated will support events including renting the North Liberty pool to offer a free pool night twice in the winter, training for foster parents in the spring, as well as other fun family activities throughout the year.

EXTENDING GRACE - *Groceries for Foster Families*

Goal: \$4,000

Amount raised to date: \$321

Receiving a new child into your home results in many logistical pieces that need to align, as well as bonding between the parents and child. Extending Grace provides grocery delivery for these families to ease their time of transition.

COUNSELING SCHOLARSHIPS

Goal: \$3,000

Amount raised to date: \$2,779

Sometimes, a couple or individual needs critical care in the form of multi-day biblical counseling intensive, or other specialized care outside the walls of Grace Community Church. However, the cost is an obstacle for many who need this help. This fund provides scholarships to alleviate that burden so that these couples/individuals can focus fully on healing in Christ during this time of intensive care.

Next Gen Bibles and Resources

Goal: \$1,700

Amount raised to date: \$356

We would love to provide Bibles for any child or student without one or who can not afford one. These Bibles and resources are offered during outreach events and also for our own students in the various Next Gen ministries.

SHORT-TERM MISSIONS SCHOLARSHIPS

Goal: \$2,000

Amount raised to date: \$1,288

Twice each year Grace commissions teams to minister to the people of Guatemala in partnership with Bethel Ministries. Scholarships will be used to help make it possible for individuals at Grace to attend who otherwise would find the financial costs overwhelming.

VIDEO PRODUCTION EQUIPMENT

Goal: \$4,000

Amount raised to date: \$0

Sharing the gospel through our experiences and testimonies is a powerful way to show how we've come from emptiness to wholeness through God's goodness. Funds will purchase photography and video equipment to share the power of God's work in his people through testimonies in services on Sunday mornings and online stories.

VOLUNTEER TRAINING

Goal: \$950

Amount raised to date: \$0

Help provide training materials and a meal for Grace volunteers during our annual connections training for greeters, info desk staff, ushers, and lobby hosts.

PAST PROJECTS

DADDY DAUGHTER DANCE

Goal: \$1,200

We sought help to fund the venue for the November 2023 Daddy Daughter Dance. This is a popular event; hosting it offsite allowed more people to attend and create a meaningful outreach.

IN A CHURCH OUR SIZE, it's easy to walk in on Sunday and think that you aren't needed to serve because everything seems to run well. You might be thinking that you don't have any skills or gifts that are useful to the church, that you don't have the time to serve, or that nothing would fit into your schedule.

The goal for the January volunteer fair is to share opportunities to serve in the spring semester.

The church needs individuals who can serve in a variety of ways during Sunday services and also outside of Sunday service times. Ministries you'll see at the fair include Children's Ministry, Student Ministry, Guest Services, Coffee, Music and A/V, and Outreach, to name just a few.

WHY SHOULD I SERVE?

As the church, we need multiple people in different areas using their unique gifts and strengths to help spread the gospel and serve as the hands and feet of Jesus Christ. God made you with specific abilities to help serve the body of Christ in ways that others aren't equipped to do. This is reflected in 1 Corinthians 12:12-31 when Paul writes to the church of Corinth, saying the body has multiple members and cannot function with only one part of the body.

WHERE CAN I FIND THESE OPPORTUNITIES?

Take the first step by checking out the Volunteer Fair on Sunday, January 28, after service. Meet folks serving in different ministries and let them know if you're interested in serving with them. Afterward, a ministry leader will contact you to meet and discuss the opportunities in more detail, as well as help you decide if their ministry is a good fit for your strengths and availability.

THE WHIRLWIND OF CHRISTMAS CELEBRATIONS ARE BEHIND US and as is often the case, January brings with it reflection and setting, or resetting, of priorities. Now is a great time to be intentional about discipling the children in your home.

As a parent, I know that if I don't prioritize prayer, Scripture reading, and discussion, they don't happen. Teaching your children about Jesus can be as simple as looking out the window and commenting on the beautiful snow and how God created it, or as complex as answering their deep questions about the nature of God.

Find rhythms that work for your family so they can be sustainable; consider adopting one of these ideas:

- → Read a devotion and Scripture at breakfast, lunch or dinner
- → Ask your children about their highs and lows from their day
- → Pray over your children on the car ride to school or afternoon practice
- → Play worship music as you get ready for the day or make dinner
- → Ask your children where they saw God at work in their day
- → Ask your children for prayer requests and pray with them over their requests

Discipleship doesn't need to be flashy, it can be simple and meaningful at the same time. Above all, walk through each day with Deuteronomy 6:5-8 as your guide,

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates."

When we walk in light of this passage, we will be intentional about pursuing Jesus and leading our children to do the same. *
